WHAT CAN THE CITY DO TO SUPPORT YOUR ORGANIZATION IN ADDRESSING HOMELESSNESS?

Policy changes in local ordinances and/or state laws:

- Addressing our local eviction laws as they can be a barrier to getting housing in the future.
- We need to have city/county coverage similar to state coverage when there is a natural cold/heat event but a state of emergency is not called.

Convening among community partners and broader public:

We need to create more affordable housing units with community/public partners.

What barriers prevent your organization's ability to better assist people experiencing homelessness?

- Funding/Resources
- Facility limitations
- Lack of Staffing

Financial resources for programs, services, staff, etc:

- **Staffing** is a very significant need and with more staff we can provide for more guests at a higher level of care. This is especially important during heating/cooling events as The Salvation Army is the only organization that does not limit the number of guests inside the facility.

Facilities

- With restructured facilities The Salvation Army could have capacity to significantly expand our ability to administer our facility as a heating/cooling station. By redesigning our facilities to a more secure and open day program space, Center of Hope would have the bandwidth to shelter an increased number of guests, especially during a cooling/heating event.
- Storage is a significant issue for those experiencing homelessness. We do not have the capacity to store the number of guests we serve and so many of their belongings.

Transportation

- Transportation can be difficult for guests, especially when trying to seek services. Many end up utilizing the bus or uber which strains their budget to be able save.
- Mental Health professionals on site at our shelter to help with crisis situations as we run into them daily.
- Lack of respite care from the hospital to permanent home. So many times we have individuals unable to care for themselves that are staying at the shelter. We do not have trained staff to care for personal daily needs.
